Sarah Stubblefield called the meeting to order at 3:35 p.m. to conduct the following items of business:

#### Announcements:

- Ms. Stubblefield introduced a new staff member supporting the Committee, Ann Foss from the Office of Strategic Initiatives.
- Ms. Stubblefield shared new resources from the U.S. Census Bureau, including a video released on social media on April 1, 2019—one year out from Census Day 2020—and a fact sheet publication, which she also emailed to the Committee members.

#### **Presentations and Discussion**

Tony Herhold presented the Asian Community demographic profile analysis to the Complete Count Committee. The demographic profile analysis of target communities serves to provide the Arlington context to that target community. This context then informs the Committee on how to build awareness and buy-in within this target community to encourage participation in the 2020 Census.

Upon presentation of this profile, the following questions were asked:

- Is it possible to get data on poverty rates within the subgroups of the Asian population? Is it possible to get data on age groups within the target community?
  - o Mr. Herhold will investigate the availability of this data.
- Why is the Committee targeting the Asian community?
  - Ms. Stubblefield responded that there was a low response rate among the Asian population in Arlington in 2010, according to Census data.

The Committee then held a wide-ranging discussion on targeting the Asian community for Census participation, including the following topics:

- The Asian community is spread out across Arlington, so it may be useful to hold activities at gathering places, such as markets and places of worship, as well as at important events within the community.
- Social service organizations and local influencers will be useful to target the Census message in the Asian community.
- Since there are many subgroups within the Asian community, translating materials into multiple languages will be helpful.
- The Arlington and Mansfield Independent School Districts are developing Census action plans, and the Committee members and City staff will coordinate and leverage these efforts.

The Complete Count Committee then spent time filling out activity planning sheets for the Asian community and shared them with staff. The activity planning sheets will help to identify realistic outreach activities, maximize the impact of outreach efforts, and develop a comprehensive outreach plan that targets all hard-to-count communities. Staff will review all suggested activities and make recommendations to the Committee regarding which activities seem most feasible for outreach with the available resources.

There being no further business to come before the Committee, the meeting was adjourned at 4:45 P.M.


# AFRICAN AMERICAN COMMUNITY demographic profile analysis

## HARD TO COUNT COMMUNITIES

The goal of the Census is to acquire an accurate count of all residents in order to ensure fair representation and accurate fund dissemination.

Certain communities within Arlington have been identified as "hard to count" for reasons such as language barriers, suspicion of government, access hindrances, etc.

The third hard to count community we will be focusing on is the African American population.

#### WHY THESE METRICS?

- The following data is intended to provide a more granular snapshot of the African American population in Arlington.
- Metrics used to measure the African American community are consistent with those used by the Census Bureau to calculate the Low Response Score (LRS) estimates.
- This data is meant to help understand the poverty, housing, and language barriers within the African American community and aid in increasing Census response rates.
- To be used in conjunction with local community expertise.




## LOW RESPONSE SCORE (LRS)

- Metric used by the Census to locate, predict, and manage hard-to-count communities
- Many factors taken into account when calculating LRS (minority population, poverty rate, language, etc.)
- Census ROAM Mapper provides an online interface for viewing LRS on tract level




Arlington census tracts with highest LRS (greater than 30%)

#### GENERAL INFORMATION

African American residents represent a large portion of those living in Arlington.


- 85,023 residents (21.9% of population)
- 18,975 families (20.5% of total)
- Median Age 28.6
- Median Household Income \$51,786 (\$55,562 for City as a whole)
- 1,978 African American residents are of Hispanic or Latino origin



#### **POVERTY**

The African American community experiences poverty at a higher rate than Arlington as a whole.


- Poverty Rate 19.3% (compared to 16.1% for total pop.)
- 18.2% of Households received food stamps (5,392 total households)
- 67.8% of African American families with children living below the poverty level are single-mother households
- 26.7% of Arlington families below the poverty level are African American



#### HOUSING


- 29,601 African American Households
- 18,975 households consist of families (i.e. householder lives with one or more relatives)
  - 53.1% of families consist of non-married householders (79.5% of these households have a female householder)
- 67.7% renter-occupied housing units (vs. 44.4% for City as a whole)
  - Renters clustered in North Arlington, Owners clustered in Southeast
  - 46.3% of households are in multi-family complexes (3+ units)





#### GEOGRAPHIC MOBILITY


- Much of the African American population is in the same home as they were one year ago (74.5%).
- 14.7% moved to their current home from within Tarrant County.
- 49.8% of African American residents were born in Texas, while 32.8% were born in another state.



#### NATIVITY AND LANGUAGE

- A large proportion of the African American community is foreign-born.
- 13,387 African American residents were born outside of the U.S.
- 54.2% are not currently U.S. citizens
- 13,103 residents were born in Africa
  - Nigeria (4,062 residents)
  - Kenya (1,738 residents)
  - Ghana (1,328 residents)
- Of those foreign-born residents that speak another language at home, 32.0% speak English less than very well




