On Saturday, April 22nd, APD Officers and several recruits participated in the Healthy Kids Day Bike Rodeo at the YMCA on South Cooper Street. It was a fantastic day, filled with fun and adventure, but it wasn't all play and no work for the officers. An officer was approached by a young lady named Gracie and her mom who had found a lost bird that came up to them. They were concerned about the bird since it appeared to be friendly but lost. The bird had a few ruffled feathers and was looking guite hungry. The officers at the scene quickly identified the bird as a cockatiel, due to its unique appearance.

After much discussion about what to do with the bird, the officers decided to take it to Arlington Animal Services. Officer Sandham volunteered to take the

bird. Officer Waghorne decided to check the internet to see about the bird and found a post on Pawboost for a lost cockatiel. Sure enough, they found the owner who immediately came to the event to meet the officers.

We confirmed the bird, named Beanie, was the missing bird and he is now safely at home. Beanie had been missing since March 30, 2023. Although Beanie lives in Grand Prairie, it is still unknown how he ended up in Arlington at the YMCA. It was a heartwarming and rewarding experience for all involved, and a reminder of the importance of compassion and kindness towards all creatures great and small. 
HELP PUT THE BRAKES ON AGGRESSIVE **DRIVING AND ROAD RAGE**

Road rage is becoming an increasing problem and the Arlington Police Department is working diligently to make our roads safer. APD takes road rage very seriously and the Traffic Section is taking efforts to combat this issue. These efforts include:

- A road rage hotline. This hotline has fielded more than 105 calls and more than 90 letters of notification have been mailed.
- Weekly team enforcements with all the traffic units where data is used to target specific high crash locations or citizen complaints.
- Using a subdued graphic patrol vehicle to work the major highways looking for aggressive drivers. The car allows officers to blend in with normal traffic.
- Partnering with Tarrant County District Attorney's Office to arrest aggressive drivers.
- Conducting education efforts on traffic safety which includes DWI, seatbelt usage, and aggressive driving.
- A BRAND NEW online report system via the Arlington PD website. Click here, then select the option that says "Submit a Road Rage / Aggressive Driving Report Online." Once you fill out and submit the report, we'll take the same steps that we do with the hotline and work to encourage the aggressive driver to change their driving habits

We want to stress the hotline and online reporting option are for NON-EMERGENCIES only. If you find yourself or someone else in danger on our roadways, you should ALWAYS call 911. If you witness aggressive driving or a non-emergency road rage incident, please get the license plate of the vehicle when it's safe to do so and call the APD Road Rage Hotline at 817-459-5389 or file an online report. You should provide, if possible, the license plate number, a description of where you witnessed the aggressive driver, and what behaviors were observed. APD will then attempt to identify the registered owner of that vehicle and directly notify them of the dangerous behavior. Help us keep our roads safe!
