The Big Night Out is Over ... What's Next?

On Oct. 7, neighborhoods across the city organized National Night Out block parties and outdoor gatherings with their neighbors and friends.

Residents spent the evening interacting with one another and the police officers, fire officials and city leaders who joined them. Using social media, newspaper ads, billboards, flyers and safety fairs, the 2014 event mobilized more people than ever before. According to the Crime Prevention Unit, more than 190 NNO events were registered with the department. Now that the big night is over, what's next?

"We want to see the momentum continue," said Officer Kimberly Fretwell, who served as the lead coordinator for NNO 2014. "We want to see neighborhoods continue to work together with their police department.

Dorothy Ouma has reached an important milestone in her career with the City of Arlington. On October 23, she was recognized for three decades of continuous service.


"Coming from a village in Kenya, east Africa, I am very appreciative of the Arlington Police Department for giving me opportunities. This has brought honor to me and my Kenyan community," she said.

Her anniversary post on APD Facebook last week was shared on social media platforms throughout east Africa.

In 1982, Dorothy came to Arlington in search of an education and opportunities. She worked during the day and took college courses at night. In 1984, her first job with the City was in janitorial services. She worked in the Arlington Public Library before joining the Arlington Police Department in 1996 to become a detention officer. She also earned her bachelor's degree in social work.

When the City of Arlington created the Police Service Assistant program comprised of civilians to support basic police operations in 2003, Dorothy was among the first hired. Since then, she has earned accolades from the Crime Scene Unit for the work she has done to process scenes using fingerprints, which have led to arrests. She's responded to thousands of calls for assistance and is a primary transport for police equipment such as Sky Watch Towers, which are used to deter crime.

With her passionate smile, she's a welcome site to officers who need her. Sgt. Spencer Kimbro describes Dorothy as one of the hardest working PSAs in our city.

North District HEAT Officers Play a Big Role in Tourism Safety

The Arlington Police Department's North Hotspot Enforcement and Tactics team, also known as HEAT, maintains a visible presence on our streets. They patrol our city and identify potential problems or hot spots for crime. A recent assignment took them along Watson Road and into the city's thriving Entertainment District to interact with hotel managers on safety.

North HEAT Officers Ryan Tarver and Ashley Daniels lead discussions with hotel managers about the proactive measures they can take to prevent and reduce criminal activity.

They talked about the benefits of hiring security, additional exterior lighting and making sure hotel exit doors remain locked and are only accessible by guest room keys.

HEAT officers also suggested that hotel managers consider posting signage that lets criminals know that illegal activity will not be tolerated. They also emphasized the

importance of maintaining good records. City ordinance requires hotel management to keep accurate records as a first-line defense to prohibiting illegitimate customers from residing in a place where current identification is mandatory.

Officers suggested that hotel managers consider enforcing house rules such as curfews and placing limitations on the number of visitors to reduce foot traffic after hours.

With every encounter, these officers give hotel managers direct access to the HEAT Unit, leaving them with their phone numbers and e-mail addresses. Hotel staff were reminded to call 9-1-1 to report emergencies or any suspicious activity.

This kind of community policing builds legitimacy and trust between officers and our business partners. The outcome is a safer city for our thriving hotel industry and the millions of visitors who make Arlington their destination.

Another Fine Example of Great Police Work in the South District

The South Police District is filled with officers who serve with compassion and Foot Patrol Officer Kendrick Smith is one shining example.

On a recent call, Officer Smith made contact with a man who appeared physically shaken and afraid.

Three suspects chased the man and attempted to engage him in a physical altercation. Officer Smith determined that the suspects were possibly the same ones who burglarized the man's home a few weeks earlier. Because of the man's condition, Officer Smith drove him to his home and upon arrival, discovered that the man's home had been burglarized again.

In addition to taking a burglary offense report, Officer Smith visited area pawn shops and identified some of the man's stolen property. Through this effort, he linked the suspects to the stolen items that led investigators to make several arrests.

The compassion shown by the Foot Patrol Officer on this call is a shining example of the great police work that occurs every day in the



South Police District.

First Responder Appreciation Day Salutes North Texas Heroes

On Sunday, Oct. 19, nearly 80,000 football fans at AT&T Stadium paid tribute to First Responders during pre-game and half-time ceremonies.

The tribute featured more than 500 service personnel from North Texas area police and fire departments, emergency medical service providers and federal officers from the U.S. Customs and Border Patrol.

On the field, members of a joint police, fire and federal Honor Guard presented the color and Dallas Police Choir along with a combined Pipe and Drum Corp led a musical tribute to First Responders.

"It was an outstanding tribute," said Officer Zhivonni McDonnell who worked with the National Football League and AT&T Stadium officials to coordinate the big day.

This moving tribute on the field at half time was followed by a big win for the Dallas Cowboys. The Cowboys celebrated a victory over the New York Giants with a final score of 31 to 21.
