## Awards Ceremony Celebrates Service and Success

A tradition that salutes the very best in public service returned Feb. 24. The Arlington Police Department Awards Ceremony at the Arlington Convention Center was sponsored by the Arlington Police Foundation, the John V. and Jeri McMillan Memorial Fund along with contributions from many local restaurants and businesses.

Awards were presented to those whose exemplary service contributed to the overall success of the Arlington Police Department in 2015. Two community awards were presented.

The 2015 Citizens Community Award was presented to the Church on Rush Creek for the impact this congregation of 5,000 is making in the city. This church sponsors a job fair, operates a food pantry which serves over 2,600 and helps to sponsor fun, safe events for youth and families.

"This award was a surprise for us," said Compassion Pastor Brian McFadden who accepted the award. "The entire city works so well together. We're all working toward the same goal, which is a better community for us all to live in."



The Business Partnership Award was presented to the Women's Center of Tarrant County whose mission is to inspire, teach and empower women and families to overcome violence, crisis and poverty. Accepting the award was Laura Hilgart, president and CEO of the Women's Center and Deborah Caddy who serves as director of Rape Crisis and Victim Services.

This year's emcee was Fox 4 News Anchor Steve Eager. Close to 650 were in attendance.

The ceremony also featured the award-winning APD Honor Guard and singing of the National Anthem by Officer Peter Hughes.

## Community Highlights From Not In Our Town

From the auditorium, there was audience participation in many forms. Some wrote questions on cards while others took notes as part of a class assignment. Some turned to Twitter and used the hash tag #NotInOurTown to engage panel members.

From 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. on From 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. on Feb. 11, close to 120 people filed into UTA's Lone Star Auditorium for the first in a series of community discussions hosted by the Arlington Police Department. The audience watched "Waking in Oak Creek" which was followed by dialogue about hate. Dr. Jaya Davis of the UT Arlington Criminology and Criminal Justice Department was the event moderator.

"Waking In Oak Creek" is the true story of a community in Oak Creek, Wisconsin who finds inspiration after lives are shattered by a hate crime when six Sikh Americans are killed during a religious gathering in 2002.

UTA Graduate Student Vanessa Johnson who is studying crime and religion this semester, said the topic was of great interest to her.

"I was mostly impressed that so many important people from my community thought it was important enough to have a discussion on this topic," she said. "They came out and sat down with us and they made us more aware. This can happen anywhere."

Panel members included Police Chief Will Johnson, Alisa Simmons, president of the Arlington branch of the NAACP; Luis Castillo, president of the League of United Latin American Citizens. Other panelists included Mujahid Bakash of the North Texas Islamic Coalition and Murjan Altaweel, president of the Dareleman Islamic Center.

After the event, Chief Johnson said the community dialogue must continue. This is the first of several being planned this year.

Not In Our Town is part of a national movement to stop hate and build safe, inclusive communities. It is being led by the U.S. Department of Justice and the Civil Rights Committee of the International Association of Chiefs of Police.

## LIFE SAVING AWARD 2016 Officer Rescues Woman, Answers Most Rewarding Call of His Career

The phone lines were lighting up in the Arlington 9-1-1 Dispatch Center. On a cold December morning, callers were reporting a woman on a bridge.

According to police reports, it was approximately 2 a.m. and the woman on the overpass was close to the edge.

Officer Ryan Garman was on midnight patrol in the South Police District and the first on the scene.

"As I began to talk with her, I was able to confirm immediately that "this was a serious matter," he said

Officer Garman was careful not to startle the woman as she inched backward to the edge.

"We were able to communicate with one another and I could see she was visibly shaken and upset," he recalls.

"I focused on trying to get her away from the edge without causing harm to myself. I got lucky. Focus paid off. "

The woman surrendered and was transported to a local hospital for treatment. Later that day, she thanked officers for the intervention.

At an Arlington Police Department Manager Meeting on Feb. 11, Police Chief Will Johnson presented Officer Garman with the Life Saving Award for his quick and decisive actions on the overpass. The announcement was met by applause and a standing ovation.

For civilian staff members, it's a time to renew commitments to workplace code of ethics.


Police Chief Will Johnson said, "we are all reminded that our oath is a solemn promise we take to protect, defend and serve."
