


This Summer, Think Safety and Prevention

Throughout the city, people are outdoors enjoying the beauty of another Texas summer. Officers say summertime can also be a time for crimes of opportunity.

Unlocked car doors, items left in plain view inside vehicles and open windows create opportunities for crime.

On June 27, the APD Entertainment District Tourism Unit hosted a Tour S.M.A.R.T Safety Fair, putting the focus on summer fun, safety and crime prevention.

S.M.A.R.T. is an acronym for Safety Means Always Remember to Think.

"We're reminding everyone to think safety and prevention whether their plans include traveling or staying closer to home," said Sgt. Jakisha Jones. "We want to see everyone out doing their part, being smart and having a safe and enjoyable summer."

The period between Memorial Day and Labor Day is also believed to be a time for increases in crashes on area roadways.

Traffic safety remains a priority for patrol officers, according to the APD Media Office.

"Buckle up, monitor your speed and avoid distractions inside the vehicle," said Police Sgt. Paul Rodriguez. "The life you save could be your own."

SUMMERTIME SAFETY

Monitor speed. SLOW DOWN and drive safe. Avoid distractions inside the vehicle.

Do NOT Drink and Drive.

At the lake or swimming pool, always wear a LIFE VEST. Never leave children unattended.

NEVER leave children or pets inside of a vehicle.

When working outdoors, stay hydrated and take frequent WATER breaks.

When temperatures climb, check on your neighbors, especially senior citizens. If you find a neighbor in distress, CALL 9-1-1.

LOCK. TAKE. HIDE. **LOCK** your vehicle, whether it is in a parking lot or in your driveway. **TAKE** your keys. Never leave your vehicle running unattended. Officers say, if you have to leave your belongings in your vehicle while shopping and touring, be sure to **HIDE** them.



If your summer plans include vacation travel, make sure your doors and windows are locked. Citizens On Patrol are the extra eyes on neighborhood streets. They are trained to identify and report suspicious activity. If you see suspicious activity, call 9-1-1.

A special thanks to Officer Herd for his compassion and to ACAPP for providing this family with all of the necessities they need for a good night's rest.







Arlington PD Facebook Follower Found Him!

Tanya Ray is one of 55,000 followers who like the Arlington Police Department's Facebook page.

Last month, her social media connection with APD has an Arlington family liking her. "We are so very thankful to Arlington police and the lady who recognized my father and called police," said Kendra Jeffers. "We are thankful that she was on Facebook."

She Recognized a Familiar Face

Tanya Ray was driving south on Cooper Street when her daughter saw a man who looked familiar.

Freddie Eric Jeffers had been missing for more than 12 hours and the subject of an ongoing search.

Kendra Jeffers said her family along with officers searched all night and into the morning for her father. He'd recently relocated here from the U.S. Virgin Islands.

The family provided officers with a photo and the APD Media Unit shared it across its multiple communication platforms.

Mr. Jeffers was last seen on June 2 walking home from a store in his west Arlington neighborhood when he disappeared.

Tanya Ray and her daughter saw the Arlington Police Department FB post. On June 3, they recognized Mr. Jeffers and called 9-1-1.

Officers arrived and returned the man home safely to his family.

Social media continues to be a powerful communication tool for getting the word out, said Officer Zhivonni McDonnell, who manages content for the APD Facebook and Twitter pages.

Officers Go Shopping for Suspect in Theft Case

Stolen Items Returned to Rightful Owners



SOUTH ARLINGTON POLICE

When an Arlington woman found her son's stolen laptop computer and other missing items for sale on Craig's List, she went to the Arlington Police Department for help.

Detective Trisha Walker was assigned the case. From a description and partial

serial number, this detective was able to determine that the laptop belonged to the woman's son. A second laptop and a cell phone were also stolen. These items belonged to her son's co-worker.

Detective Walker along with South Criminal Investigations Division pulled a team together to develop a plan to meet their suspect. They went shopping online, pretending to be a customer wanting to buy the laptops and cell phone.

"At this point in our investigation we had enough information to set up a buy with the seller," Detective Walker said.

At the meeting location, the serial numbers matched and an arrest was made.

Officers also confiscated four new tires traced to a stolen trailer. Detectives believe their suspect was part of a fencing operation involving the buying and selling of stolen property.

"Engrave your valuable items and store the serial number in a safe place," Detective Walker says. "Marked property can help us identify and return property to the rightful owners."

Arlington Police Foundation Launches Membership Campaign

The Arlington Police Foundation has launched a membership drive.

residents and businesses inviting them to Back the Blue. Annual membership dues are \$100. A lifetime membership is \$1,000.

Becoming a member has many rewards.

Every dollar raised goes to the Arlington Police Department to support public safety initiatives not typically supported by tax dollars.

The foundation was established in 2003 to support the families of fallen officers. Over the years, their purpose has grown to include so much more.

In 2012, the Police Foundation purchased life-saving trauma kits for all officers.

In 2013, they funded light bars for the Motorcycle Unit to enhance safety and visibility at night for both

officers and the driving public. The foundation is also a sponsor of PAL (Police Athletic League) Camp, providing youth with opportunities to take part in summer mentoring

campers with officers.

The foundation organizes the Annual Back the Blue Bash and Police Awards Luncheon to celebrate the outstanding work of officers, community volunteers, business partners and civilian APD employees.

The foundation is governed by an advisory board and 10 community volunteers who give freely of their time and talent to support APD.
