Inside the gymnasium of a north Arlington church, teens from Lamar High School took a step closer to their future.

At The Rec, close to 100 students found more than afternoon snacks, recreation and shelter from the heat inside the North Davis Church of Christ.

This year's activities inspired more teens to start thinking about the future.

"We wanted to see the kids doing more than playing basketball," said Lt. Thedrick Andres.

Together with North Patrol Sergeant Karen Standback, officers worked with church staff to expand after school activities. They reached out to area businesses.

The community response was great, said Bailee Searcey, a Youth Minister Apprentice at the church.

"The classes opened their eyes to what they can be doing now to prepare for their future," she said. On the upper level, the Allied Federal Credit Union taught students how to open a checking account and manage money.

The following week, another class put the focus on resume writing.

On April 28, a job fair at The Rec exposed teens to summer employment opportunities. Some of the employers included the Texas Rangers, Six Flags Over Texas, Hurricane Harbor, Dairy Queen and the City of Arlington Parks and Recreation Department.

The Rec ended with a friendly game of basketball with APD officers.

When He Saw Illegal Activity, This Citizen Made the Right Call

Two West District patrol officers were recently dispatched to a 9-1-1 call inside of an apartment complex.

Upon arriving, a maintenance worker told officers what he saw in plain view as he entered a unit for inspection.

The man told officers he was surveying the property for damage from the recent storms. Flyers had been distributed to every tenant, informing them when the inspections would occur.



Apparently the tenant in this particular unit was too busy to read his flyer. Officers found his notice in a trash can.

On the kitchen counter, in plain view, was close to 70,000 pills and over 20 pounds of

marijuana. While officers were on scene, the tenant returned home and was immediately taken into custody.

Officers Maurice Phillips and Quinn Grimmett along with Sergeant Ray Polk conducted a thorough investigation of this apartment unit. They also found several guns and a large amount of cash

This is another good example of what happens when a citizen sees illegal activity and reports it immediately to the police department.

An arrest was made and a large quantity of prescription drugs, narcotics and guns were confiscated, making this neighborhood a safer place for everyone to live, work and visit. Thanks for making the call.

Real Talk: Fake Weapons Are a Safety Concern for Police and Community

They look like the real thing. Even veteran officers have to look close to determine if the weapon in front of them is real or fake.

Across the country, police officers are seeing more crimes being committed with imitation weapons. Arlington is not immune from this public safety problem.

An officer sitting in his patrol car in April was approached by a teen with a weapon. Police reports say the 15-year-old pointed his weapon at the officer who was able to quickly knock it out of his hand. It was determined that the teen's weapon was a BB gun replica.

On another 9-1-1 call, a fake weapon was used in the attempted robbery of a convenience store. Officers ordered the man to drop the weapon and he did. He was apprehended by police and charged with robbery.

Arlington detectives say fake weapons might seem "cool and fun to young adults, but they should never be displayed in public."

"Kids carrying fake weapons around pose a danger to themselves and everyone around them," said Police Detective Sean Wheatley.

When caught with a fake weapon, the crime is as severe as illegally possessing a real weapon.

APD Media Sergeant Vanessa Harrison said the threat to public safety is real. "Our message to the community is

help us be advocates for stronger legislation that restricts the sale and manufacturing of replica guns. We want parents and guardians to talk with their children about gun safety and the risks involved with possessing a BB gun."

30 Years Later, This Officer Still Reports for Duty

Officer John Morgan can remember a time when arriving to work meant calling the front desk at the main station to find out where to report for duty.

That was 30 years ago. Today, there's geographic policing, which places officers in an assigned area that allows them to get to know the people and places.

Officer Morgan joined APD when the police station was a one story building on West Main Street. This was before the Parks Mall. He said south of Interstate 20 was a two lane road, a rural haven for trespassing dove hunters.

Population growth and development has changed

the Arlington landscape, but Officer Morgan says his love for his city and police department remains unchanged.

"I tell people I'm too young to retire. I like the variety that comes with every new day on patrol. I like the people I work with a lot and the community is great."

On June 9, Officer Morgan was recognized by his city and police department for 30 years of service. There was a standing ovation at the Manager Meeting.

This father of two says he has no immediate plans to stop reporting for duty.

"I don't need to retire or go to work doing anything else," he said. "I like Arlington and the city it has become."



Officer Morgan has spent most of his 30 years on patrol except for an 8-year stint as a detective. He reports for duty everyday as a Day Shift Patrol Officer in the East Police District.
