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State of the Police Department Annual Report to City Council Highlights Crime and Safety

One day after being sworn as the new commander in chief, Arlington Police Chief Will Johnson presented the annual "State of the Arlington Police Department."



The report to the City Council on March 19 showcased public safety progress made in 2012, and unveiled a crime reduction strategy for making Arlington a safer city. The Focus on the Five involves more citizen involvement, a refocus on geographic policing, intelligence gathering, and

multi-year planning combined with effective enforcement designed to change behaviors.

During the March 19 address, Chief Johnson touted the success of citizen-driven initiatives such as National Night Out. In 2012, he said 40 new Community Watch groups organized. Citizens On Patrol members logged more than 7,500 volunteer hours in their neighborhoods.

The State of the Arlington Police Department does more than highlight success, it summarizes crime trends and some of the department's biggest challenges of 2012, including the recovery efforts associated with the tornado that hammered neighborhoods near I-20 and U.S. 287 on April 3, 2012.

In 2012, the department recorded a 21 percent decrease in UCR (Uniform Crime Report) part I crimes as part of a special operation in the South Retail District, Chief Johnson said. Vehicle burglaries dropped 46 percent and theft-related offenses also declined in this area because of a coordinated response involving citizens and businesses working together.

Chief Johnson told city leaders "Arlington is not immune" from cyber crimes, domestic violence, DWI and human trafficking. He said a "spirit of teamwork exists" with school administrators, including private campuses, as everyone works to review crisis response protocols and campus security plans to keep Arlington schools safe.

In Arlington, a Pinwheel Garden will be on display from **April 7-12** on the lawn of the Ott Cribbs Public Safety Building. This garden will feature 323 colorful pinwheels. Each represents the number of sexual abuse cases investigated by APD in 2012, according to Detective Emma Trevino.

When Severe Weather Strikes, Arlington Residents Know What to Do

When severe storms hit two weeks ago, interrupting phone service for thousands of south Arlington residents, the City of Arlington activated its Emergency Operations Center to assist those who were not able to dial 911 from a cell phone or land line.

The EOC served as the central command center for a coordinated response effort involving the Arlington Police Department and Fire Department until phone service was restored.

One year after a tornado hit southwest Arlington on April 3, 2012, the Arlington Police Department remembers that day and all of the efforts that went into recovery and rebuilding. Amongst the fallen debris and shattered structures, there were no serious injuries or fatalities.

Severe weather season is here and preparation remains our best defense!



When a Tornado Watch or Warning has been issued, watch for:

* A dark, often greenish sky, wall cloud or super cell (a heavy, lowering cloud that is rain-free and rotating)

* Large hail

*A loud roar similar to a freight train

Seek Shelter Immediately

Designate a shelter area in your home or place of business.

If an underground shelter or basement is not available, move to an interior room or hallway on the lowest floor and get under a sturdy piece of furniture. Stay away from windows.

Never attempt to outrun a tornado in your vehicle. Seek shelter in a sturdy building.

If no shelter is available, exit the vehicle and find a low-lying area such as a ditch or ravine. Lay flat on your stomach and cover your head with hands.

It takes the average freight train travelling at 55 mph more than a mile to stop. This is equivalent to the length of 18 football fields. At railroad tracks, stay alert! Avoid distractions inside your vehicle that could prevent you from hearing or seeing an approaching train.
