Arlington and Panama City Law Enforcement: International Partners for Safer Communities

ARLINGTON, TX __ With more than 1,800 miles of terrain between them, the cities of Arlington and Panama City, Panama are working together to improve their communities as part of an exchange program that creates opportunities for international learning.

Sponsored by the International City/County Management Association, the Arlington Police Department is sharing best practices, crime data, training and professional development information with Panama City law enforcement agencies. Panamanian delegations are learning more about Arlington's School Resource Officer program and community engagement initiatives such as Citizens on Patrol, Citizens Police Academy and Hispanic Citizens Police Academy. They have toured the Emergency Operations Center, Dispatch and Jail operations and shadowed officers to learn about youth programs and faith-based partnerships.

Acting Deputy Police Chief Os Flores, one of four delegates selected to represent APD, said the exchange program is presenting opportunities for learning and information sharing.

"Through this program, we have been given a unique opportunity to highlight successful programs and assess other possible approaches to further connect with the communities we serve," Flores said.

Officer VaNessa Harrison sharpened her Spanish language skills so that she could benefit from the information sharing that occurs between the agencies. She is joined by Officer Faviola Delgado, an East District Crime Prevention Officer. About 90 percent of the population in Panama City is bilingual.

"Like America, Panama City, Panama is a melting pot of people from many ethnicities," said Officer Harrison. "There is tremendous respect for cultural differences and law enforcement."

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On Call in the North District

APD and Faith-Based Group Set Out to Educate More People About Heat Safety

Bishop Leonard Oldums and his wife, Barbara, of Cornerstone Outreach Church in Arlington, were watching the evening news when they saw a report about a child who died because he was left inside of a hot vehicle. He and his wife traveled to the Arlington Police Department to see how they could help get more education into the community about the dangers of the heat and leaving children unattended in vehicles. On a hot summer day in Texas, the temperature outside can climb above the 100 degree mark. Even on a cool day, the temperature inside a vehicle can rise quickly.

"I wondered how long it would take for the heat inside my car to become unbearable," Bishop Oldums said. He climbed into his car, rolled up the windows and turned off the engine. In less than four minutes and 20 seconds, he said it became difficult to breathe.

After meeting with the APD Community Support Bureau, the Oldums organized their congregation to begin distributing educational flyers. I joined them in August at a nearby shopping center to talk with shoppers who were moving about the parking lot in their usual daily rush. On this day, the motorists we saw took their children inside the store with them. Fortunately, we found no children or pets alone inside vehicles! Thank you, Cornerstone Outreach Church. Your efforts on this summer day could save a life!


On July 30-Aug. 2, East District Officer VaNessa Harrison, Acting Deputy Police Chief Os Flores and Lt. Leo Daniels visited several communities in Panama City, Panama. They observed some successful crime reduction initiatives such as a local park that features an interactive traffic safety course for children. This program is aimed at reducing traffic accidents and fatalities among youth. During the class, children drive around in go karts simulating vehicles on the roadway. Other children act as pedestrians learning how to properly use crosswalks.



Arlington officers toured a neighborhood, which has been dilapidated for several years. Panama City is making significant investments to rebuild the area. Residents are being given an opportunity to help with reconstruction. They are gaining job skills, earning an income and increasing pride and ownership in their community.

While there, Arlington officers also taught community-based policing programs and attended a conference that focused on youth development.

It is with great pride that we highlight the achievements going on in the East District as study and learn new ways to connect better with the communities we serve.

Located near the Pacific Ocean, Panama City, Panama is a hub for international banking and commerce. Like Arlington, tourism is an important revenue generator. During a recent visit, Arlington officers were led to a daycare center for about 1,000 school-aged children where they observed municipal police officers participating in an integrated educational approach to personal safety and teaching youth about the importance of making positive choices.

Lt. Leo Daniels said the program allows him to see how sustainable community change cannot be driven by law enforcement and government alone.

"The commitment to change must come from within the community with the support of police, city government and the private sector," Lt. Daniels said.

Acting Chief Will Johnson said any law enforcement entity that seeks to be the best must "constantly reassess and improve."

"Our partnership with Panama and ICMA gives us the perfect opportunity to do just that, and advance our reputation for not only being one of the greatest police departments nationally, but internationally," he said.

"We are so grateful to the Arlington Police Department for all of the time they have put in to this partnership," said Isabelle Bully-Omictin, director of the ICMA Municipal Partnerships for Violence Prevention in Central America. "They have helped to change the perception of the police and citizens with respect to the role of the police in Panama and the importance of prevention, which will have a lasting impact on society."

Good Police Work Spotlight! Agencies Work Together to Interrupt Cable Battery Theft Operation

The Arlington Police Department took the lead on an organized theft investigation that resulted in the arrest and indictment of suspects responsible for a rash of cable battery thefts in north Texas. The operation involved multiple law enforcement agencies.

Investigators said suspects were "posing as Time Warner personnel, breaking into cable supply cabinets and stealing batteries and power supply wiring harnesses." The metals inside the batteries were exchanged for cash.

"When a battery was stolen, it wasn't just cable service being interrupted," said Sgt. Kyle Dishko. "Customers were losing telephone and internet services, including the ability to call 9-1-1 in an emergency."

During a one-year period, Time Warner reported 228 battery theft offenses in Arlington alone. Working with Time Warner security officials and other jurisdictions, a regional trend was soon confirmed. Communities were engaged, including Arlington's Citizens on Patrol who circulated bulletins while on the lookout for suspicious activity.

Using decoy batteries containing GPS devices, pole-mounted surveillance cameras and batteries with serial numbers, investigators conducted sting operations inside recycling businesses and recovered the stolen batteries. Warrants were issued and suspects were arrested and indicted.

"This is a great example of good old fashioned police work and how public and private partnerships together can build strong regional relationships that make a difference," said Assistant Police Chief Jaime Ayala.
