No One Should Wonder About Their Next Meal

In Arlington, nearly 8% of residents are uncertain about their next meal, which represents thousands of neighbors quietly facing hunger each day. For seniors living alone, parents working night shift, and families stretched thin by rising costs, food insecurity is a daily reality.

With a \$186,687 grant from the Arlington Tomorrow Foundation, Arlington Charities is tackling this challenge head-on through its Groceries with Dignity project, a two-pronged approach to helping Arlington residents.

The expanded Home Delivery Program will not only bring more than 20 days of fresh, nutritious groceries directly to 100 additional homebound seniors and residents with disabilities, but also a friendly hello and reassurance that they are not forgotten.

For working families, Arlington's first After-Hours Grocery Program will install 18 smart refrigerated/freezer lockers, giving them the freedom to pick up pre-selected groceries whenever it fits their schedule — before dawn, late at night or between shifts.

Together, these efforts will serve more than 5,600 additional Arlington residents each year.

This is more than hunger relief. It's dignity, convenience and hope and a promise that no Arlington resident should have to wonder where their next meal will come from. The Arlington Tomorrow Foundation is proud to help make that promise real.



Supporting Arlington Moms When It Matters Most

Every birth is a beginning. In Arlington, too many beginnings have been shadowed by dangerous complications that can follow mothers home after delivery. The North Texas Maternal Health Accelerator is changing that story, and the Arlington Tomorrow Foundation is proud to help.

Led by the Burnett School of Medicine at TCU and UT Southwestern, the Maternal Health Accelerator brings hospitals, community partners and data experts together around a simple idea: when a mom is supported, a community grows stronger. With Foundation support, NTX-MHA is launching a personalized postpartum care network for Arlington mothers at highest risk for hypertension — the leading cause of readmissions in the weeks after birth.

Here's what that looks like on the ground: before a new mom leaves Medical City


Arlington, Texas Health Arlington Memorial or JPS – the three hospitals that

account for nearly half of Arlington births – she will receive a blood-pressure cuff and clear, easy steps to use it at home. Within days, a care navigator checks in, and if a mom needs more help, nurses step in to assist. And throughout it all, her original

care team stays in the loop, closing the gaps that so often lead to emergency returns.

This effort will help more than 1,000 Arlington mothers each year, with a special focus in neighborhoods in the 76010 and 76011 zip codes, where complications are highest. The goal is bold and clear: fewer severe obstetric complications and millions saved in avoidable healthcare costs that can be reinvested where families live, learn and work.





Where Care Meets Comfort: A Gift for Arlington's Women

Every woman deserves to feel safe, supported and comfortable when she's seeking healthcare. That belief is at the heart of the Arlington Tomorrow Foundation's recent \$500,000 grant to Texas Health Arlington, helping fund the hospital's \$9.7 million upgrades to its Breast Center and Women's Center.

For nearly four decades, the Breast Center has been a trusted place where more than 9,000 women each year come for screenings, answers, and peace of mind. Soon, those visits will feel even more

welcoming. The center will feature a bright new reception area, a dedicated biopsy suite, state-of-the-art 3D mammography, and modern exam rooms — updates

that will make care not only more advanced but also more comfortable during what can be an anxious time.

The Women's Center will also see meaningful improvements. From refreshed waiting areas to upgraded labor and delivery operating rooms and a modernized OB emergency department, these changes are designed to give women and their families a calmer, more updated experience when it matters most.

This grant is more than a gift — it is a promise to every woman in Arlington that her health matters, her comfort matters, and her future matters. The Arlington Tomorrow Foundation is proud to play a part in ensuring that the women who care for our community have a place where they, too, are cared for with excellence.

Levitt Pavilion's Next Act: Building the Levitt of Tomorrow

On warm Arlington nights, the sound of music drifts across downtown, inviting families, friends, and neighbors to gather on the lawn at Levitt Pavilion. It's where kids dance barefoot under the stars, where first dates turn into anniversaries, and where more than 100,000 people each year discover new favorite bands — all for free.

But after 18 incredible seasons, the behind-the-scenes systems that make the Levitt magic possible are showing their age. To keep the music playing at the high standard Arlington residents have come to expect, it's time for a major encore performance.

That's why the Arlington Tomorrow Foundation has committed \$1.7 million toward the Levitt Third Generation project. This project will completely refresh the venue's audio, video, lighting and HVAC systems, ensuring top-tier production quality, improved safety, and a better experience for everyone, from Grammy-winning artists to the neighbors who bring their lawn chairs every weekend.

The upgrades will mean richer sound, brighter and more immersive lighting, bigger and better video screens, enhanced security and improved comfort for performers and crew. They will also expand the Levitt's ability to livestream concerts and host community events, helping even more people connect with music, whether they're on the lawn or watching from home.

This investment is more than new equipment. It's a vote of confidence in Arlington's cultural heart, ensuring that residents won't have to leave the city to find world-class entertainment. It's a promise that the Levitt will remain a place where music and memories are made, season after season, generation after generation.



More Books, More Possibilities

For more than 100 years, the Arlington Public Library has been a place where curiosity is sparked and opportunities take root; where a child finds their first favorite book, a student discovers the resources to chase their dreams, and adults connect with lifelong reading and learning.

But, that mission was at risk. Budget shortfalls threatened to shrink the library's collection, leaving shelves with fewer choices and longer wait times. But thanks to a \$100,000 grant from the Arlington Tomorrow Foundation, Arlington's library system was able to keep its promise to the community: that everyone would have access to the books and resources they need.

This funding kept the collection robust and diverse, including not just the bestsellers, but the stories and voices that represent Arlington's unique and growing population. More than 1.6 million items were checked out last year, and thanks to this support, wait times for popular titles were shortened and new materials were added across all formats, from print to e-books to

audiobooks. Each checkout is moment of connection, a small step toward learning, joy or possibility.

The Arlington Tomorrow Foundation's investment will do more than fill shelves — it protects access and reaffirms that in Arlington, every resident deserves the chance to discover, grow, learn and imagine.

- To focus efforts on key areas of organizational growth, yet be flexible enough to meet individual professional development needs of nonprofit executives


